

We are reporting to you that all of our members who were injured in the Felton Street Fire are on the road to a physical recovery. Your prayers and good wishes enhanced each of those members to surpass expectations of the doctors.

On a dimmer note, it is with great sadness that 4 of our brothers from the Oakland Police Department were murdered in cold blood. Our prayers and hopes go to their families that they will be able to manage this devastating act of urban terrorism.

With the upcoming Memorial Day holiday on May 31st we can honor our fallen service men and women and keep in our prayers our members, both active and retired, who are serving our country in war zones, as well as the sons and daughters of our members who are currently serving our country in the armed forces.

Your union is in the process of enlightening San Francisco residents of the value of their neighborhood firehouses. It's just human nature to take us for granted; our bravery and fast response times. Yet there is discussion about the potential of closing our engines, trucks, squads, chiefs and ambulances. We have gone to print media, the Internet, the airwaves via radio and TV, explaining the hazards and dangers of closing a neighborhood firehouse. Dan Dunnigan from Engine 13 is in charge of field operations. I am sure that he will be in contact with your home companies regarding literature distribution. Thank you for your efforts.

With the crash of the stock market and the vast amount of layoffs in San Francisco, the City's shortfall has been claimed to be \$600 million. We will keep you abreast at union meetings and by Department email regarding the City's budget process.

Your Executive Board went to Washington DC and met with Speaker Pelosi, Senators Feinstein and Boxer and Congresswoman Speier. The position that 798 took is that San Francisco needs their fair share of the Stimulus package, specifically engine replacements and infrastructure components.

This year's St. Patrick's Day Parade was another grand success, with 30 firefighters from Limerick, Ireland marching with us. We even received a plaque for our military bearing and marching in unison. Thanks to all who attended. A NOTE OF THANKS . . .

On behalf of our Board of Directors, I would like to thank all of you that continue to contribute to the San Francisco Firefighters Cancer Prevention Foundation. From those of you that contribute from paycheck to paycheck through the "Combined Charities" program and to those of you who write a single donation check – thank you all!!

We would also like to send out a special thanks to Jim Vannucchi, Ron Apostoli, et al. for the "Bocce Ball" fundraiser and Tom Abbott and Dave Ritter, et al. for the "Escape from Alcatraz" fundraiser. All money raised and donated to OUL Foundation will be used for further screenings and studies for the early detection and prevention of cancer in our active and retired firefighters.

We would also like to thank the current Administration for their monetary support of our screening programs.

By now every active firefighter 40 years of age and older should have received and hopefully returned their colorectal screening kit. Colorectal cancer in firefighters

throughout our nation is on the rise over and above the general population. The colorectal cancer screening kits were also handed out to retired firefighters at the last luncheon in Petaluma. Any retired firefighter that would still like to receive this kit please contact us at SFFCPF@sbc-global.net with your name and mailing address. All kits must be turned in by May 15th.

What's on the horizon? UCSF is taking the next step in their study of cancer in the genitourinary system of firefighters (kidney, bladder, ureter). This time the results from our tests will be combined with the results from the Houston Fire Department to present even more evidence that this type of cancer is more common in firefighters than the general population and is job-related.

Our Board of Directors has also approved to contribute up to \$250 to any firefighter, both active and retired, who requests a second opinion if diagnosed with cancer. This \$250 would be put toward any out-of-pocket expense not covered by insurance for a second opinion. We also have an excellent resource of the doctors of UCSF that our Foundation is in contact with should a second opinion be necessary.

The Department, through our Foundation, has also been invited to participate in a pilot study to determine if there are elevated levels of dioxin in the blood of firefighters after a working fire. Dioxin is a known cancer-causing agent and a by-product of combustion of articles treated with fire retardant. study calls for five firefighters to voluntarily give 20cc of blood after a working fire and at the completion of overhaul operations. The study is being conducted by Dr. Kannan Kurunthachalam (Professor, Dept. of Environmental Health Sciences. SUNY at Albany: Director. Environmental Chemistry Track, Dept. Env. Health Sci.; Chief, Laboratory of Organic Analytical

Chemistry, New York State Dept. of Health). This was arranged by Dr. Arlene Blum, Visiting Scholar, Chemistry, University of California, Berkeley and Executive Director, Green Science Policy Institute.

This is an excellent opportunity for the fire service in general. If there are elevated levels of dioxin, Dr. Kurunthachalam will use this pilot study for a large proposal for funding an in-depth study. The costs incurred by the pilot study will be paid for by our Foundation.

The San Francisco Firefighters Cancer Prevention Foundation will continue to look into and take advantage of any new non-invasive testing procedure that will help our active and retired firefighters lead a healthier life. We can be reached at SFFCPF@sbcglobal.net.

RADIATION FOR LUNCH

Six years ago, I found out I had breast cancer when Jen, who's now my wife, came to the firehouse with our deaf Dalmatian Joey to tell me. It was a really beautiful August day. I was at Station 9, when Jen came to visit and asked me to come out to the vard. She wanted to talk to. We sat in the car and she told me I had breast cancer, that the test results came back positive. My whole world spun around, my body felt weak, I was immediately in tears, devastated. Then I said, "Jen, it can't be. Not me." And she said, "I'm so sorry, it is you." I kept touching the dashboard, slightly slapping it saying over and over, "Jen, I have cancer."

Two weeks earlier I was concerned with something small, thick and unusual on the lateral side of my right breast. The next week I saw my gynecologist for a regular check-up. I told her about my breast, and she reassured me it seemed unremarkable. I was scheduled for a routine mammogram and asked if there was another way besides a mammogram to check that spot. Knowing my history of being very health conscious/hypochondriac she was understanding and said she would order an ultrasound as well. At the end of my appointment, she reassured me again it was probably nothing. Just a fibrous tissue, which I previously had.

After the mammogram, which came back negative, they performed the Ultrasound. The nurse had difficulty finding the spot I felt on the ultrasound. After several minutes, she asked Dr. Fry to examine me. He asked me to show him where I thought the spot was. He spent some time looking as well, then found a spot approximately .9mm long. He took an image of it. He reassured me it was probably an insignificant spot, saying 90% of these are benign. I asked him if he could take a sample of it, and he said he was going to per-

form a core biopsy. I wasn't worried, or really concerned at this point. But I was glad I would get a definitive answer. I was prepped. Then he made a small incision and used a trigger vacuum device to remove five tissue samples at the site. I felt discomfort, but we talked about softball the entire time. He played competitively, and I played socially. I told him the only difference between him and me was denial. He agreed and told me I'd know the results within two days. The nurses asked if there was someone at home that could receive the information if I wasn't home. I said yes, still not giving it much thought.

After Jen and Joey left Station 9, I called a meeting. I told everyone at the station the news, cried, and received a lot of kindness and support. Chief Serrano asked if I wanted to go home. I told him no, that I could work and I wanted to work. So I finished out my shift (had a gun shot medical call that night which made me aware of the absurdity of young men from the same neighborhood shooting each other) and drove home.

I had the lump removed, some tissue around the margins, as well as lymph nodes. The next three months was a regiment of 33 radiation doses, doctors visits, talks with nurses, talks with breast cancer survivors I knew both in the fire department and outside, acupuncture appointments, regular gym workouts, absorbing statistics, phone calls from friends and family, and treating the developing second-degree burns on my breast. I had radiation for lunch, and Station 38 allowed me to park for my treatment at Cal Pac. Aside from three watches I took off for surgery, I worked throughout my entire treatment. It was important to me to live life as normally as possible.

At times I felt very sorry for myself. One of my worst fears had come true. I often thought about the day after I found out I had cancer. I was horribly vulnerable and trying to prepare myself for the radiation treatment I was told I would need to go through five days a week for seven weeks. I didn't want to leave the house, but was anxious and wanted to work out. Jen suggested I go to the gym because it was a familiar place, and then told me to come home right away for lunch. I agreed and drove myself to the gym.

I walked into the locker room to put on my gym clothes. In walks a member of the fire department I hadn't seen in a while. I asked her how she was doing. For the next 45 minutes, she proceeded to tell me how her mother had just died of cancer, about how "the radiation burnt her to death." She went into details: how her face became disfigured, it was so painful to watch her mother die. I was crying, naturally supportive. She must have thought I am the most empathetic person she'd ever met. Towards the end of the conversation, she asked me how I was doing. I said, "good," nodding repeatedly, not sure what to say. I didn't have the heart to tell her I was just diagnosed with cancer the day before. I put my clothes right back on and drove straight home. Clearly I was not ready for the real world.

There were many other anxious and later-on laughable moments: the volunteers who were there to be supportive by showing me their reconstructed breasts and tattooed areolas, using words like "lumpec" and "mastec" gleefully. Before surgery, one of the volunteers popped into my room for last-minute support. I turned to Jen and said, "Jen I can't handle this right now." Jen told me to cry for her, that she would then hug me and go away. So I did. And she did. The person who actually

helped calm me most was the 7-yearold boy who was getting his tonsils removed. I asked him if he was nervous and he said, "No! I get ice cream afterwards!" And I thought, what a great idea.

I decided to stay at work during radiation treatment to help me feel normal. I needed the structure and comradery. My close work friends, even people I wasn't so close to, the Union, the administration, and the medical leave supervisor were all very kind and supportive to me. Everything from sincere checking in to, "How's the rack?" and, "I heard you kept them." It all made me laugh and feel loved.

Then came Worker's Compensation. I wanted to file a claim. Joe Moriarty offered so much kindness and an abundance of research—both medical and law research. Karen Heald gave me lots of coaching on the legal process and what I should expect. At the time (and still), there was little research linking breast cancer to products of combustion. Moriarty gave me an article on a CHP officer who won her breast cancer case because she had worked in a rural county, exposing her to pesti-Recently, our Dr. Terrazas, also found the lack of study involving breast cancer and firefighting. He's concerned with elevated Polycyclic Aromatic Hydrocarbons (PAH) levels, a potentially carcinogenic compound, and cited research in wildland fires possibly linking products of combustion with breast cancer.

I filed a claim for coverage because I knew about so many other members with denied claims. I thought it would bolster awareness and put pressure on the department to influence the city's insurance company to follow California State law. I gathered information about my then 14-year history of fire exposure. We are all aware of those cancer claims are wrongly denied all too often. I was grateful I had the energy and where-

withal to logs all my fires. I wanted to do this not just for myself, but for all my peers battling cancer, sometimes in very ill states, trying to sit through journals to prove their exposure.

My appointment with the worker's comp doctor was less than satisfying. Before my appointment I was told by the caseworker that Joe Moriarty could not be present, and that Jen also could not go. I insisted my partner come with me. The caseworker relented, but instructed that Jen could not speak. During the "medical exam" the doctor asked about my grandmother who died of cancer. which I informed him was not true. He informed me the anti-depressants I had taken three years earlier for eight months (Zoloft) could be linked to increased risk of breast cancer. He told me there was an increased risk of breast cancer because I do not have children. He told me there is increased risk in Jewish-American women of Ashkenazi decent (Eastern Europe) which of course I had such ancestry.

By this point I am quietly furious, and it appeared he was trying to intimidate. (By the way, this appointment occurred during my first week of radiation.) I thought to myself, I guess the city should never have hired a Jewish-American woman who was never going to birth children and use, at some point, anti-depressants to get over a break up. She would get cancer, definitely.

Then came the pop quiz. What was I exposed to? Jen had been researching the chemical names of products of combustion. I had skipped this because it made me nervous to know what exactly we are absorbing in our bodies. So I didn't have the answers for him. I merely told him, "Look around, Doc, everything in the office that could burn, and then some. Actually just yesterday we had a mobile home fire. It was nasty." He asked again, almost smirking, "Well, what chemicals were you exposed to?" And I said,

"I'm not a chemist. I'm a firefighter. But I can tell you, it was nasty." I saw Jen sink into her seat, as she was not allowed to speak. She told me after we left she thought we had been set up. She also told me she noticed the doctor's fingernails were revoltingly dirty.

I wasn't surprised to hear my claim was denied. Right away I hired an attorney to file an appeal. Joe Moriarty, Karen Heald, and Mat McNaughton were right there to support me in this step by step.

During my deposition, they asked me tangential questions regarding my exposure to smoke. Aside from asking me why I don't wear a SCBA during overhaul, they didn't ask any questions about my exposure to smoke in fire service for 14 years. Instead, they asked me about smoke exposure in previous jobs: as a solderer in an electronic factory in college, as a cashier at Food Town on Long Island, as a social worker in mental health, and as a truck driver for FedEx. I had to tell them, no, I wasn't exposed in any of these jobs. I avoided the designated smoking areas. "So you were never exposed to workplace second-hand smoke?" Yes, I responded, "at Station 17, back in 1990 and 91. There were a good number of smokers there." they made a big deal about attending "public places of entertainment" prior to the State public smoking ban. I visualized myself dancing to Page Hodel's music at The Box, and didn't notice the smoke.

The deposing attorney's big ace in the hole was not wearing an SCBA during overall. Was I aware of the mandatory Scott rule? And had I willfully violated it? I responded, "Yes, I did. Along with 1,800 other members, including superiors."

About a year and a half later, it took a judge 10 minutes to rule in my favor because of the California Presumptive law and the burden of proof on the City, not me. You might think I would feel excited, but it was

completely unsatisfying. The whole process felt like a waste of time and very unethical. I felt down and discouraged. I asked Jen to get me a smoothie. Jen too was tired. She held my hand and said, "Ah honey". "Come on Jen, I have cancer." And then she said, "You had cancer. It's out of your body. You only get to say that for another year. Then it's over."

To all the members of the San Francisco Fire Department who lost their lives to cancer, you are in my heart. And to all the members who have fought cancer and survived, you give me strength. We do the best we can with our lives. I ask all the readers of this article to hold up their end of the bargain-do your tests, press your doctors for information and don't let them be soft, and take care of yourself. In many ways, the only difference between me and the firefighters that didn't make it was luck. Thank you for all your support. I am proud to serve as a member of the San Francisco Fire Department, and I am proud to serve on the Cancer Committee. We are really trying to make a healthy difference in our profession. Believe it or not the Cancer Committee is a lot of fun too. 🛠



March 29, 2009 To all Retired and Active Firefighters:

I am writing this letter to urge all the retired firefighters who have received the colorectal cancer screening test kits through the San Francisco Firefighters Cancer Prevention Foundation to please complete the test screening and forward them to the SFFD physician's office for processing.

There is no cost to anyone for this program, and it is a simple process that is important to your personal health and welfare. According to Tony Stefani, as many as two-thirds of all the screening test kits that have been given out HAVE NOT BEEN RETURNED.

Why is this important to you? To make sure you don't have colorectal cancer, and if you do have something, early detection goes a long way to curing the cancer.

From a personal standpoint, I just

went through the testing process, which is why I am writing this letter urging everyone to do the screening. In my case, the test came back positive for traces of blood. I was advised to contact my own physician, who had me do a second test, which came back negative. My own physician also had me do a colonoscopy, which found a polyp in my colon. While it was benign, it was a type of polyp defined as cerated atanoma, which carries a higher risk for cancer of the colon. I will be checked in three years again for any changes.

I am sharing this information to motivate anyone who has a test kit to do the test process and return it for analysis. I also urge all members of the department to take advantage of all the health and safety programs made available by the department and Local 798.




